Erasmus Plus Project

For a week beginning on 9 May, Skinners' Academy played host to a group of visitors who were taking part in the Erasmus Plus Project. The visitors included the Vice Mayor of the Municipality of Gorno and a group of 21 primary teachers, secondary teachers and head teachers from Poland's Swietokrzyskie region.

The group's schedule was filled with a variety of training sessions and lectures delivered by Skinners' Academy staff. The rest of their school time was dedicated to observing a series of lessons across various departments.

Thanks to the kindness of our neighbouring primary school, Woodberry Down, the group could also observe some of the lessons taught to pupils below KS4 and were impressed with the calm and purposeful atmosphere of the school.

During the afternoons the Erasmus group enjoyed sightseeing. Every day they visited some of the most iconic land marks and tourist attractions in London. The delegates also had the opportunity to learn more about the history of the Skinners' Company when they visited the Skinners' Hall in Cannon Street.

The guests were astonished by the Academy building and the resources that pupils and teachers can use. They were impressed by our clear rules and policies regarding pupil behaviour and how polite and respectful our pupils are. They all agreed that Skinners' Academy is an inclusive learning environment where everybody can achieve their best.






































Message from Ms McKinstry

Soaring through the skies

On 27 April, a small group of Year 12 students attended a Gliding Taster day at The Air League base in Dunstable. The day itself was spilt into two sections. The first was based indoors where we spent time talking about careers in aviation and practiced some mock job interviews - no one was spared from this experience! It was towards the afternoon when the weather was starting to become unpredictable that we finally got to try our hand at gliding.

Standing in the middle of a field, we were quickly briefed about safety and how to control the glider. There were looks of concern as they demonstrated how to put on a parachute and how the eject button worked on a glider. While everyone else took turns to get towed up in the air behind another plane before their glider was detached, I was offered the opportunity to fly a motorised glider. My gliding instructor just flipped a switch and we took off. This meant that not only did I have to use radio to talk with someone sitting next to me due to the moaning of a motor; I also was up in the air with the parachute!


If you have ever been on a rollercoaster, than you know the uneasy feeling of rising higher and higher, knowing that you're going to have to come down at some point. My experience was not like that- it was a fast rise that lasted hundreds of metres, aided by the crazy weather we were experiencing at the time.

As you get higher things like motorways start to transform into tiny lines and the cars zooming past looked more like beetles than machines from such a distance. Rather than looking down at the landscape, if you look up you start to notice strange weather patterns. Directly above is clear blue sky, to my left is a city getting rained on and to my right is a snowstorm - the instructor was interested in the latter and decided to fly over to get a closer look.

With a snowstorm right behind me, my instructor decided now was the perfect time for me to start flying the glider unaided. With a brief reminder of how to fly by stick and rudder, I was told to practice a few turns before we got going. If you've ever tried to fly a plane in a video game and had a hard time understand that the game probably works just fine, trying to turn the glider without causing it to stall took five tries. I could see the visible relief on the instructor's face as we landed.

For all the panic and the fear for my life, if I was offered to fly a glider again I would probably jump at the chance. Everyone (including the staff!) enjoyed themselves and I would recommend similar experiences to anyone who is offered the chance.

Launch of the iRoundUp Scheme

The five Year 11 pupils who form team iRoundUp; Mark Daniel, Matthew Daniel, Agnieszka Rudnik, Daisie Spiteri and Elif Sucu; have celebrated the end of an extraordinary year-long journey from classroom to boardroom.

The pupils will see their winning business idea from the 2015 Mosaic Enterprise Challenge, a competition driven by Mosaic, HRH The Prince of Wales' mentoring charity, turned into a commercial reality by ParentPay.

The team's simple, yet ingenious idea rounds up payments made using ParentPay's electronic payment system, with the excess then being donated to a nominated charity.

Word quickly spread of iRoundUp's idea and before long, Clint Wilson, CEO of ParentPay, invited the pupils to the company's offices in Coventry to discuss the possibility of incorporating the scheme into ParentPay's existing payment tools.

Now, one year on, Clint Wilson has officially announced the professional launch of the iRoundUp scheme which will be rolled out across ParentPay's 6,000 schools.

Clint Wilson said: "Skinners' Academy is a centre of excellence for enterprise and seeks to empower their pupils to contribute positively to the community. Combining that spirit with ParentPay's reach across millions of parents and pupils, and Mosaic's ethos of inspiring young people to realise their talents and potential is what iRoundUp is all about.

"The Skinners' Academy pupils have been supporting the design and development of the iRoundUp concept, which we plan to launch on the ParentPay platform during the Autumn Term."

Skinners' Academy is extremely proud to be the first winner of the Mosaic Enterprise Challenge to formally launch our pupils' winning idea and turn it into a business reality with the help of ParentPay.

The pupils who form iRoundUp have worked extremely hard on their business concept, from perfecting their business pitch to approaching the CEO of ParentPay, Clint Wilson to see if there was any scope to launch the iRoundUp scheme. We are eager to begin the process of potentially raising millions of pounds a year for charity.

Their product "HangBag" is essentially a clip which carries the weight of a pupils school bag whilst attached to a table. The benefits of the HangBag is it's convenience as it clears a lot of space in classrooms for both pupils and teachers as well as reducing the amount of trip hazards.

XO Corporations were announced as the best company from Hackney and moved on to compete against other London borough winners in the National Finals. Unfortuantely they did not make it past this stage of the competition however both teams definitely had a profitable experience.



Boys' Can Sing



The Drama department have been privileged to take part in Old Vic New Voices (OVNV) for a second year! The programme is a renowned, high quality project for young people offered to only 40 specially selected schools. Pupils are exposed to exciting, innovative theatre experiences and have the opportunity to work with professional actors and directors.

The OVNV group at Skinners' is made up of 30 Year 9 & Year 10 pupils who applied to take part and have a unique experience. Throughout the course of this academic year they have been to see four very different plays and participated in pre-show workshops delivered by experienced drama practitioners.

We have been lucky enough to see the following productions:

- Future Conditional, a bracingly topical and boisterously funny new play directed by Matthew Warchus and starring Rob Brydon, with a cast of 24 young performers.
- The Lorax Adapted by David Greig and brought to the stage by acclaimed director Max Webster. Inspired by Dr. Seuss's classic tale.
- Master Builder, a searing and mesmeric exploration of power, control, death and life, Henrik Ibsen's late masterpiece in a lively new adaptation by David Hare starring Ralph Fiennes.
- The Caretaker by Harold Pinter. When it premiered in 1960, The Caretaker changed the face of modern theatre. This new production was directed by Matthew Warchus and starred the wonderful Timothy Spall.

Sadly this year's project has come to an end but we have many highlights and are keeping our fingers crossed that our application to take part in OVNV is successful again next year so that more pupils have the chance to experience what the Old Vic Theatre has to offer!



The design and creation of the E-Safety Film enabled pupils to:


- Undertake a creative project with challenging goals addressing a range of enterprising skills and social and moral issues associated with the use of technology.

Science Club

This term the science club has definitely been the most interesting and adventurous so far.

We were given permission to turn an unused patch of the school ground into a miniature garden. The first few weeks were initially used to clear away any weeds or debris from the area. We then placed labelled boxes of plants, fruits and vegetables; these bloomed over a few weeks and provided a good basis for discussion in biology.

Our biggest concern was that birds would eat our newly planted seeds; this was successfully combated with our use of handmade windmills and cd lanterns to deter the birds and anything else which could harm our crop.

The garden became a real labour of love for all those involved, but we managed to change an over grown bit of shrubbery into a small and delightful haven.

Other projects throughout the term included an investigation into crumple zones on a zip wire, a practical describing energy transfer in a pendulum, optical illusions and looking at the biology of the eye, exothermic chemical reactions in the "screaming jelly baby" demonstration, holding methene bubbles and lighting them up to create a ball of fire and designing liquid fuel rockets to name a few.

Year 8 pupils went on an ecology field trip to Finsbury Park to investigate different types of ecological sampling techniques.

They have been inspirational and dedicated in all sessions and have definitely proved their understanding of physics and in some cases done better than the teachers, especially when explaining the Maltese cross and light experiments.

UKMT Junior Maths Challenge

On 28 April, 120 pupils from Year 7 and Year 8 participated in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge.

The UKMT Individual Maths Challenges boast lively multiple choice question papers which are designed to stimulate interest in maths in large numbers of pupils. The challenge involves answering 25 multiple choice questions in one hour and is sat in school under normal exam conditions. The top 40% of pupils nationally receive a gold, silver or bronze certificate and each institution receives a Best in School certificate. Around 1200 of the highest scoring pupils across the United Kingdom are invited to participate in the Junior Mathematical Olympiad.

Marcel Latwinski (Year 7) is the only pupil who received a Gold certificate so therefore has qualified for the next round which is the Junior Kangaroo Challenge. Marcel is Skinners' Academy's first ever pupil from Year 7 to qualify.

Talk on Climate Change



Skinners' Pupils become Language Ambassadors

Health & Wellbeing

Within student services we aim to promote good health and wellbeing within the Academy offering health promotion, health reviews and individual health care plans ensuring all our pupils, whatever their health needs, get the best education.

We approach this in many different ways, from raising awareness around current health issues, such asthma and hay fever, or promoting good personal hygiene, healthy eating / exercise, and mental wellbeing. We keep up to date with current health initiatives so we can help our young people to make informed decisions about their health or direct them to outside agencies for help and support.

Wellbeing Week

From the 18-22 April, staff and pupils throughout the Academy looked at the theme of 'wellbeing'. We used assemblies to explore Mental Health Awareness Week, which normally takes place between 16-22 May, early due to Year 11 pupils being scheduled to begin their GCSE's

The topic of Mental Health Awareness Week 2016 was relationships, because healthy relationships are essential to maintaining good mental health. It is now considered that more than a healthy diet or exercise, having good, supportive relationships improves our mental wellbeing. This was particularly important for pupils as they prepared to cope with the stress of exams.

In the assemblies, pupils were encouraged to look at how relationships can affect your mental health and emotional wellbeing. They considered how, through relationships, they can support the wellbeing of their peers. Pupils particularly enjoyed the Time to Change spoken word video by Suli Breaks in which he urges #nojudgement. We left pupils to think about the message, "Be Kind. For everyone you meet is fighting a battle you know nothing about."

Our wellbeing theme aimed to celebrate the relationships, and the people in our lives that add to our wellbeing and protect and sustain our mental health. From family and friends, to peers and neighbours; taking notice of those connections can make our pupils and staff feel safe and supported.

Immunisation Matters

Each year the Immunisation team from Homerton University NHS Foundation Trust visit the Academy to deliver the Secondary School immunisation programme. Together with the London Borough of Hackney and the Hackney Learning Trust we are working together to improve the uptake of all immunisations for our pupils. At present uptake across all age groups is below the national average which means many of our young people are leaving school with inadequate protection from preventable diseases such as Measles.

The girls in Year 8 will be offered the HPV vaccination which offers protection from cervical cancer. Due to the date for the Year 8 girls HPV being very early in the autumn term; the girls in our current Year 7 will have received information about the HPV vaccination during their assembly. They were all given an envelope with an information leaflet, and a consent form for you to complete, this should be returned to the Academy as soon as possible.

Year 10 will be offered the teenage booster for Polio, Tetanus and Diphtheria, as well as Meningitis AWCY and the MMR if missed when younger. This is the last of your child's immunisations and completes the programme you began for them as babies, without this, the risk of these diseases will increase.

Year 10 pupils will have an assembly three weeks before the immunisations are due to be delivered for information about the vaccines; they will also be given an envelope with an information leaflet and consent form enclosed. All you have to do is complete the consent form and return it to the Academy.


