As the academic year draws to a close, we can look back on yet another very successful twelve months in the life and development of Skinners' Academy. On 22 March, we were visited by three Ofsted inspectors who carried out a short inspection to ensure that everything is going well. Their report, published on 3 May, reported that the Academy has been "transformed" over the past few years, that pupils "attained higher standards than other secondary schools last year", that behaviour is "at least consistently good", that pupils "feel well supported in all aspects of their development at this school" and that pupils' experience of school is "enriched by a wide range of extra-curricular activities". This fantastically positive report recognises many of the attributes which make Skinners' such a wonderful community, and is proof of our absolute commitment to our vision that every pupil should

strive to "be the best you can". My heartfelt thanks to everyone who continues to make this vision a reality.

Varied extra-curricular activities and trips have continued throughout the year, for example with our second ski trip to Austria which was held over the Easter holiday, a trip to Paris over the last weekend of term and the majority of Year 10 undertaking their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh expedition in July. Such a breadth of opportunity is only possible because of the continued dedication and enthusiasm of the Academy staff.

In addition, the past few weeks have seen our Year 11 pupils undertake our third set of GCSE examinations, and our Year 13 students sit their A Level examinations. The vast majority in both year groups have worked extremely hard over the last couple of years, so I wish them every success and happiness in August when the results are published.

## Focus on Mosaic Enterprise Challenge



### We Are The Champions...Again!

Skinners' Academy are proud to announce, for a second time, that a group of our Year 10 pupils have won the Grand Final of the prestigious 'Enterprise Challenge' competition run by Mosaic, an initiative of The Prince's Trust.

Salise Buldu, Sezen Gungor, Yaw Opoku, Ionut Tiplea and Briana Williams, who form team 'YouTeach', represented London against five other regional teams from the South East, West Midlands, North West, Yorkshire and Glasgow.

The Grand Finals were held at Hogan Lovells LLP on 17 May. There were three scoring elements; the Business Plan (30%), the live play Business Simulation Game (30%) and the Pitch to judges (40%).

The finals were hosted by BBC TV presenter and journalist Sonali Shah. All six regional teams presented a three-minute business pitch in front of a panel of judges and a capacity crowd which included entrepreneur, chef and musician Levi Roots, who was made famous after his appearance on Dragon's Den and was the event's keynote speaker.

All six teams impressed the highly experienced judging panel including Mohamed Amersi, CEO and Co-Founder of Emergent Telecom Ventures (Chairman of Judges); David Hudd, Deputy CEO of Hogan Lovells; Vanessa Arelle, Founder of TeenZapp; Fadi Itani, Deputy Director General, Qatar Charity UK; Salim Nathoo, Partner in Tech & Telco; and Nick Pickles, Head of Public Policy and Government at Twitter UK.

The judges completed their deliberations and returned to announce the teams in third and second place. After a nail biting wait, Levi Roots was given a sneak peek of the envelope with the winning teams name inside. He raised his arms with excitement and joy before team YouTeach were announced as the first place team and champions of the 2017 Enterprise Challenge. YouTeach secured this coveted win and in doing so made Skinners' Academy the first school ever to win the competition twice since it was established 10 years ago. (Our first win was in 2015 with 'iRoundUp')

As a result of the win, the team secured a £2,500 cash prize for the Academy and a £500 seed fund to start up their business along with a goodie bag filled with prizes. The pupils were also whisked off immediately after their win in two luxury Rolls Royce Phantom cars, courtesy of Smart City Prestige, and treated to an exclusive lunch at Twitter's London HQ followed by a London Eye private capsule experience. Finally, all teams were treated to an exclusive tour and afternoon tea at Harrods.

Mosaic's Enterprise Challenge is a national competition that sees mentors from the business community work with young people in schools from some of the most deprived areas of the UK to develop exciting, feasible business ideas. This year's Enterprise Challenge began in January 2017 and saw involvement from over 4500 pupils from 107 schools. The Grand Finals represented the final hurdle for team YouTeach to be crowned the Enterprise Challenge Champions.

## Stage 1: Business Plan (30%)

Prior to the Grand Finals, all six teams were required to submit a business plan by 5 May. The business plan consisted of five questions including 'What problem does the idea seek to address?' And 'Why should investors invest in your idea?'

All teams were given a 100 word limit to answer each of the five questions (something team YouTeach struggled with). Eventually after numerous stages of editing and fine-tuning, the team managed to reduce their word count and submit an informative and to-the-point business plan.

YouTeach received the highest score of all six teams for their business plan.





### YouTeach Concept Explained

YouTeach's business concept was to unite schools across the country to share fun and educational content by offering a video sharing platform exclusively for school communities. It will nurture engagement around three categories - revision, careers and talent

YouTeach were approached by a member of the judging panel, Nick Pickles, Head of Public Policy and Government at Twitter UK. He would like to explore the possibility of bringing the YouTeach concept to life with the help of Twiiter and some of his peers who work for YouTube.

Should this concept be launched, YouTeach could build a revenue of over £11million per year which will be funneled straight back into schools to combat budget cuts as well as to purchase computer systems for less fortunate schools around the world.

# Stage 2: Business Simulation Game (30%)

As in the preliminary stages of the competition, the final six teams were allocated a private room at Hogan Lovells where they were allocated 60 minutes to play as many rounds of the business simulation game as they could in order to record the highest Net Profit score.

YouTeach were really prepared for this stage and already had a plan in place of how they would tackle the game. This plan was very well organised and YouTeach did incredibly well obtaining the highest Net Profit score of all the teams, £7,678,774, almost £1,000,000 higher than the second highest scoring team.

The 2018 Mosaic Enterprise Challenge will be open to Year 10 pupils in January.

## Stage 3: The Pitch (40%)

Similar to the Regional Final, all six teams were required to pitch their business concepts before a live audience including the special guest panel of judges.

YouTeach slightly updated their pitch from the regional stage and added a few more personal and relatable moments. Since the regionals they had taken part in a Skype call with the Director of Product Marketing at Vimeo, Vitaly Shter, who gave the team some insight into the video sharing world and expressed his support of their unique business concept.

They were the third team to deliver their pitch to the audience and did so confidently, and within the three minute time limit all teams had been allocated.

The Judges listened to each presentation before their deliberation process began. The marks awarded for the pitch accounted for 40% of the total marks awarded at the Grand Finals, and were added to a spreadsheet containing the marks for the Business Plan (30%) and the Business Simulation Game (30%).

## **Enterprise Challenge Days**

This term Year 7 & Year 8 have taken part in challenge days designed to raise their awareness on social issues, combined with a sense of business and entrepreneurship. Year 7 created a greeting card company, designing and creating cards using accountancy sheets and the idea of a production line. Teams had to buy their materials and avoid waste products, they pitched and sold concepts with detailed profit margins. 












At birth we boarded the train and met our parents, and we believe they will always travel on our side.


## Good Luck Year 13

## Careers

### Work Experience 2017

Work experience remains a central part of the career development opportunities offered to pupils at Skinners' Academy and within the summer term, Year 10 pupils experienced their first week of work (Monday 15 – Friday 19 May) and a few months later, many Year 12 pupils also embarked on varying world of work initiatives (Thursday 6 July – Wednesday 12 July).

Gaining work experience is an integral part of the student journey towards gaining clarity and confidence when it comes to deciding what sorts of careers and professional experience they want to work towards (including relevant further study etc.). It is one of the best ways to truly appreciate what certain jobs entail and what skills and attitudes are needed to be successful.

Our Year 10s were resourceful in securing their placements and worked at an impressive range of organisations including BT, CBRE (the leading full-service real estate services and investment organisation in the world), University College London Hospital, Boots, Santander, Marks & Spencer, Tyssen Community School, Stamford Hill Library, London Borough of Hackney Legal Services, Rivington Street Studio, Guy Mascolo Charity, Govia Thameslink Railway, Finstead Pharmacy, Bloomsbury Publishing and many more.

They grew in ability and confidence through using their resources (from parents to siblings and staff to community members) in securing their placements, experiencing daily commutes from one part of London to another and of course getting to grips with skills needed for the roles they were undertaking. Our Year 12s furthered their experience of the working world with placements at organisations including Camp America, PWC, Omnida Studios (dance studios in Wood Green), J O Hambro Capital Management, Aylish Alexander Solicitors, B'Zar (hair salon in Soho) – with roles involving event management, social media management, marketing, finance/capital management and more. Some also took part in insight days with Tata Consultancy and Accenture.

In an era when some schools may drop work experience programmes as they are no longer compulsory according to current government legislation, Skinners' Academy continues to promote work experience as an integral part of the career development programme and are proud of pupils who embrace it wholeheartedly, with a positive attitude that is likely to serve them positively, regardless of what career paths they pursue."

## Inspiring Women in the Media

On 10 July, a small number of pupils participated in the Inspiring Women in the Media speed career networking event at The Times Newspaper offices in London Bridge.

The event, part of the Education & Employers Taskforce's Inspiring Women campaign brought together more than 100 14-16 year-old girls across London and 25 women working in the media. The aim of the event was to raise awareness amongst girls and young women of the fantastic opportunities available in the media and inspire them to aim high, whatever their dream. Run in partnership with Women in Journalism, a networking, campaigning, training and social organisation for women journalists who work across all the written media, from newspapers and magazines to digital media, its chair, Eleanor Mills who is the Editorial Director of the Sunday Times and Miriam Gonzalez founder of Inspiring Girls International took part in the event.

According to a survey of 700 news professionals conducted by City University London, the British journalism industry overall is 94% white and 55% male and most women in the industry remain underpaid and under-promoted. Together, these statistics indicate that there are opportunities to make greater strides in the media sector in terms of both gender and diversity representation. It is this context that made this trip such a unique and inspiring occasion for the girls involved.

### S-T-O-R-E Sculpture Workshop

Once again we have been lucky enough to work with professional designers from the organisation S-T-O-R-E, in creating another experimental, large scale sculpture for the Academy's outdoor area.

We started the day with 15 Year 9 art pupils spending the morning investigating the history of arches in architecture and art. The pupils examined the structural qualities of arches and why they are able to hold large amounts of weight. After making small scale models the pupils were whittled down to the strongest eight based on their ideas and team working skills. They worked outside constructing their sculpture with aluminium poles, attaching them with tape and then reinforced with aluminium tape, the pupils constructed what was to become the Arc de' Skinners'.

The sculpture created a great deal of discussion and made a real impact on the learning environment and the sense of pride felt by the students was very evident. We would like to say a massive thank you to the two designers involved, Rain Wu and James Shaw (both worth googling).


All pupils completed a series of research tasks and practical activities that enabled them to understand how the Science Museum appeals to a wide range of visitors – especially young people.

## **Student Services**



#### **MindKit**

Throughout the Summer Term, visitors from City & Hackney Mind delivered a range of 'MindKit' workshops at the Academy to Years 9, Year 10 & Year 12. Mind are the mental health charity who provide help and support to anyone experiencing a mental health problem.

MindKit is an interactive Wellbeing and Resilience Session. It taught the pupils about evidence-based approaches to look after their mental wellbeing and boost their resilience, which can improve their ability to cope with life's challenges, their self-confidence and academic performance. The Youth Wellbeing Trainers who deliver the training have their own experience of mental health issues and they shared their stories with pupils during the sessions. The pupils tried out some mindfulness exercises, which many of them described as very helpful.

The sessions covered a range of topics based on the needs of each year group, such as exam stress, social media and eating disorders. The workshops introduced the pupils to two approaches to support their wellbeing: The 5 Ways to Wellbeing and Mindful Living.

## Surviving or Thriving

In May, the Academy celebrated National Mental Health Awareness Week (8 – 14 May) with a key message of 'Surviving or Thriving', which flipped the focus away from ill mental health to look at how we can thrive with good mental health.

**Surviving -** To remain or continue in existence, especially in spite of danger or hardship

**Thriving -** To make steady progress

To grow or develop vigorously

To prosper

To flourish

To be successful

In assemblies and advisory time, we looked at a range of topics including:

- What surviving and thriving are
- · How physical and mental health go hand in hand
- How people might look like they are thriving when they are actually struggling with mental health issues e.g. Stormzy's experience of depression
- How to thrive instead of just survive thriving tools to help support your physical and mental health
- Where to get help and support with your physical and/or mental health

There was also a week-long mental health and emotional wellbeing display in the foyer, where pupils and staff were encouraged to help us build our #thrivingnotjustsurviving tree in the foyer. Lots of pupils and staff wrote down what helps them to thrive, including knitting, watching anime, sport activities, having a good sleep, family and friends.

## Parent Wellbeing Event

On 5 July, the student services team and Ms Bowling (Head of Year 11/Head of Parental Engagement) welcomed parents and carers to the Academy for a Wellbeing Evening. The event gave parents and carers the opportunity to look at and discuss the wellbeing of our young people. The evening included the following presentations:

- Understanding young people's mental health & wellbeing (Laura Windebank, Student Support Officer/Therapist)
- Mental and physical health (Catherine Carroll, Academy Nurse)
- The internet and parenting (Juma Woodhouse, Family Support Worker)

Parents and carers were then invited to an open discussion session where they could meet the team and ask any questions they might have about wellbeing. We talked about:

- How we all have mental health the same as we have physical health
- Our mental health is the way we think, feel and behave
- It is not the same as having a mental health issue
- Some people are diagnosed with a mental health issue e.g. schizophrenia, anxiety or an eating disorder
- Emotional health is not the same as being happy all the time. It is about your sense of wellbeing, of feeling ok and able to cope with all the different things life throws at you
- You don't need to be an expert to talk about mental health
- Talking about mental health doesn't need to be difficult and can make a big difference

At the end of the evening, there was the chance to collect some free goodies from Time to Change, like the handy shopping trolley token conversation starter!

We know mental health problems are more common than many people think – one in ten young people will experience mental health problems by the age of 16. That is why we support the Time to Change campaign at Skinners' Academy. Time to Change is England's biggest programme to end the stigma and discrimination faced by people with mental health problems.

We have had a very successful year completing the immunisations program for secondary age pupils, this consisted of the HPV vaccine for our Year 8 girls and the teenage booster for Year 10 girls, alongside the Meningitis vaccinations for all Year 10 pupils. If you have a daughter who will be in Year 8 from September 2017 or a son or daughter in Year 10, please take note of the dates when the Immunisation team from Vaccinations UK will be here for the next academic year.

The HPV vaccination programme consists of two doses for all Year 8 female pupils. The two provisional dates are:

- 1st Dose Monday 2 October, 2017
- + 2nd Dose Wednesday 9 May, 2018

The provisional dates for Year 10 Revaxis & Meningitis ACWY vaccinations are:

- Tuesday 6 February, 2018
- Wednesday 28 February, 2018

I cannot stress how important it is that all pupils complete the full immunisation program as offered so they move forward into adulthood fully protected against some very serious and life threatening illnesses.

Around two weeks before the dates given above, I will deliver an assembly to inform the girls in Year 8 and all the pupils in Year 10 exactly what the immunisations they are having are. They will then be given a consent form for you to complete and sign which should be returned to me as soon as possible. If you do not receive a consent form please ask your child about it or call the Academy. If you have any queries please contact me directly.
